Discovering Maiden Names

Speaker: Glenda Gardner Lloyd

A female ancestor's maiden name can sometimes be very hard to find. The family tree chart will stop branching at that point, unless her name is discovered. Fortunately, applying indirect methods to our research can provide the key to successfully solving such mysteries. Glenda Lloyd explains, "Identifying females is one of the hardest challenges genealogists face. Often you have clues in your other records that will lead to these ladies. A woman generated fewer records than her husband, brother or son. Use these people close to her to solve the mystery."

A favorite returning speaker, Glenda Gardner Lloyd is a longtime genealogist and fourth-generation Northern Californian who grew up on a cattle ranch. She taught elementary school and worked as a reading specialist for 38 years. Glenda helped organize Root Cellar, Sacramento Genealogical Society and served as its first president. She has taught genealogy classes through San Juan Adult Education for the past 28 years and does workshops for many local societies. Genealogy is her hobby and passion, which she generously shares with us!
