Reconstructing Family Information When You Start with Almost Nothing: A Case Study

Often a modern family has little solid information from which to build a family tree. This case study will demonstrate techniques and sources that enabled a researcher to reconstruct six generations of a family which emigrated from Eastern Europe to rural western Pennsylvania in the mid-1800s, although the search began with only the slimmest of remembered information: a town name, one person's last name, a married woman's first name, and a third person's occupation. A key clue was an obituary in a newspaper.

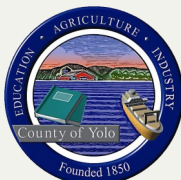
